

Qualification summary

Introduction

On average, work in confined spaces kills many people every year across a wide range of industries, from those involving complex plant through to simple storage vessels. In addition, several people are seriously injured. Those killed include not only people working in the confined space but those who try to rescue them without proper training and equipment. Confined spaces pose a multitude of hazards. This 3–Day local course is designed for personnel who need to increase their safety awareness of confined space in their work setting. The course incorporates Ministry of Labor guidelines, Safety Requirements for Confined Space.

Learning Outcomes:

- Identify different types of Confined Spaces and describe his roles and responsibility.
- Describe risk assessments relevant to confined spaces work activities
- Identify control measures for work activities to be undertaken in confined spaces and explain how to use them.
- Perform Safe entry to Confined Spaces
- Demonstrate how to carry out emergency rescue and recover casualties from confined spaces

Contents:

- Definition, Types and Legislation
- Safe Entry into Confined Spaces: Risk Assessment, Safe System of Work (gas monitoring and ventilation) and Permit to Work
- Emergency Rescue: Rescue methods, Rescue equipment and Rescue Team
- Practical Application: Carry out emergency rescue and recover casualties from confined spaces

Homework

To read HSE Guidance note and understand it Confined Spaces Regulations 1997 HSE

Entry Requirement:

Candidates should be minimum 18 years old, able to read and write, physically and psychologically capable and medically fit.

Course Duration:

18 hours classroom and practical work of which 2 hours assessment and 2 hours private study.

Training Methodology

Presentation, Classroom activities, Video and practical work using confined space simulator and confined space equipment and PPE.

Certification:

The candidates should attend at least 80% of the course. After successful completion of the course, candidates will be awarded the Level 2 Confined Spaces Entry and Rescue certificate and Confined Space Entry and Rescue License valid for one year.

Qualification grading

The qualification grade is based only on the result from the question paper. But learners need to achieve a 'Pass' in both Question Paper and Practical Assessment before the certificate is issued.

Minimum Pass rate is 70% in the Question Paper and passing all the practical parts.

Progression

This qualification is mandatory for people who needs to work in confined space, however for high-risk areas candidates are advised to progress to level 3

3. Policies

3.1 Requests for access arrangements/reasonable adjustments

Access arrangements and reasonable adjustments are modifications which are approved in advance to allow learners with either a permanent or long-term disability or learning difficulty, or temporary disability, illness, or indisposition. Requests for access arrangements/reasonable adjustments must be made during the registration process.

3.2 Requests for special consideration

Special consideration is given to learners by means of adjusting their marks. learners who have not been able to demonstrate attainment because of temporary illness, injury, indisposition, or an unforeseen incident at the time of the assessment.

Learners who feel disadvantaged due to illness, distraction, or any other reason during the assessment must report this to the invigilator before leaving the assessment place and request that their written statement, together with the invigilator's comments on the statement, be sent by the training Admin Manager

3.3 Malpractice

Malpractice is taking seriously by Al Mashreq Training as one pf the important measures for the integrity of the assessment and certification.
